"This is a joyless marriage," one said. Things got very quiet. The other said, *"This is a loveless marriage!"*


These have been a difficult couple of years for several reasons for our workers, congregations, lay-leaders, and schools. Challenges ahead for sure. **Have we become a joyless church?** Where is joy to be found and given in our midst? Is joy not important?

Well, it must be kind of important! Our Lord Jesus has said, *"These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full"* (John 15:11). The next verses connect His sacrificial love with our love.

I am intrigued by this passage from the Lutheran Confessions speaking of saving faith: "... people are righteous by faith, by which they believe that God is reconciled, and he adds that this same faith makes alive, because it produces peace, joy, and eternal life in the heart." (Apology of the Augsburg Confession)

We live in serious times. We deal with serious matters. We face Satan and an increasingly antagonistic culture and country. We repent of our own sin, both selfishness and selfrighteousness.

Yet, with King David and the Church through the ages, we sing, "*Restore to us the joy of our salvation.*" That is both a prayer and confession of faith. The Lord is the giver of Salvation and that is a gift. The future of the Church and Gospel proclamation is under the direction and protection of the Lord of the church. He is in charge!



Some thoughts on being joyful:

Listen closely and often to the Word of God read, taught, and proclaimed.

Rejoice in the gifts given in Christ for the Church and the world.

Celebrate and give thanks more often in your life and congregation.

Take your fear, anger, and self-serving opinions to Christ in exchange for true love and true joy.

Trust God as you listen and encourage others.

Keep the main thing the main thing - Jesus, His Work and Word.

Laugh and have some fun. (That works in the Church, too.)

"God loves a cheerful giver" (I Corinthians 9:7).

Exchange me for us and us for them.

Sing together.

The world is desperate for joy so the harvest is ripe for us. Truth and joy come together because both are gifts! *"The Lord has done great things for us; we are glad"* (Psalm 126:3). **Thanks for your prayers and financial support of our common work!**

Convention NEWS



What JOY! we have as we anticipate the 60th Convention of the LCMS Northern Illinois District!

The LCMS Northern Illinois District Convention affords an opportunity for worship, nurture, inspiration, fellowship, and the communication of vital information as it relates to our District and Synod. It is a wonderful blessing that our Lord works through us in our community of faith.

The convention convenes Friday and Saturday, March 11 and 12, 2022, at Concordia University Chicago, River Forest, Illinois. There, delegates from over 200 of our congregations, church workers, lay leaders, and representatives from our partners in ministry will all gather together.

The triennial convention was to be held in 2021, but due to COVID restrictions it was delayed until 2022 so as to enable the in person gathering. Nominations for President, Vice President, Circuit Visitors, NID Secretary, Board of Directors, Concordia University Chicago Board of Regents, and NID Nominations Committee have already been submitted. Voting delegate submissions for pastoral and lay delegates have been requested from each congregation, and overtures have been received for our work together in Advancing His Kingdom.

Our Convention Statement:

The Church at her best is richly and fully in the Word of God. There is a union between the Word, Centered in Christ, and the work of the Holy Spirit. Our life together, life with God and place in the community is formed by Christ's Word. No wonder the Lord wants His Word to "dwell in us richly." Martin Luther said, *"The Scripture is all Christ."*

What does it look like when the word of Christ dwells in you richly? Grace produces gratitude. Then comes generosity. What you've received, you share. You have an open posture toward others. God's words surround and clothe you. You look more like Christ in that you share with others compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience, forgiveness, and love.

What Joy! we share in the Good News that Jesus Christ is alive and well and working through His Church to redeem and restore all that is lost and broken in His world. He does all of the hard work, but we get to be part of it!

Joy in Discovering DIFFERENCES

Learning about others and experiencing new things can open a student's mind to wonder, discovery, shared faith, and joy. A partnership between the LCMS Northern Illinois District and CLEF (Chicagoland Lutheran Educational Foundation) leads students to experience that joy throughout the year.



The partnership, called Stirred to Love, takes its title from Hebrews 10:24, "and let us consider how to stir up one another to love." The program brings together teachers and students from urban and suburban NID schools so that students can make new friends and glimpse lives different from their own.

"The whole idea is for students from pre-K to high school to partner in a meaningful way," said Janet Klotz, who has been executive director of CLEF for nine years and sat on the board for three years before that.

The things learned can be as simple as an urban child discovering and being amazed by how many stars are in the sky at Walcamp, to a suburban child realizing how streetsmart urban children are.

Lois Stewart, NID Mission Facilitator for Schools, has come up with many ideas for the program. Ideas include a book club where students read together or read to younger children, Christmas and spring parties, field trips, pen pal and card sharing, and school spirit activities during National Lutheran Schools Week.

"Some of the schools have done movie nights," said Klotz. "Also, on one field trip, two of the sister schools visited Concordia University where they took a tour and had lunch together. We really want the kids to know that the University is here and all it has to offer."

Donna Laughlin, Principal of Immanuel Lutheran School in Batavia, explained that COVID has had an impact on the program. Still, last year the pastors of Immanuel and their sister school where able to lead chapel at each other's churches, and Laughlin will be leading chapel at St. John's in November.

"In addition, last year, the two schools did a food drive together for the food pantry at Concordia University," said Laughlin. "This year we hope to do a service project together at Feed My Starving Children, and we plan to attend each other's spring musicals. We're hoping to play some non-conference basketball games against each other, bowl at St. John's bowling alley, and compete together in a Knowledge Bowl hosted by Immanuel."

Ethnic Ministry GATHERING



Ethnic ministry means the privilege and joy of our participating in what Jesus is already doing to usher in His Kingdom: Christ's commission is to *"make disciples of all nations"* (Matt 28:19). The word nation here is where we get the word ethnic.

On September 25, 2021, church workers and laity from around the LCMS Northern Illinois District gathered at Concordia University Chicago to participate in Christ's commission. They were able to hear and be inspired on the work that lay ahead for us from Rev. Dr. Leo Sanchez, Rev. Dr. Yared Halche, and Rev. Dr. Roosevelt Gray.

There is most certainly the need to joyfully participate in local communities. The participants were able to see the conversations with people of all backgrounds and contexts as valuable and necessary for ministry and leading with Grace and Gospel.

We intentionally work toward the realization of God's desire that *"all people be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth"* (1 Timothy 2:4). We receive Joy! in the knowledge that the Gospel is being shared with all of our neighbors.

Joy in God's People Studying Together-INCARNATE COMMUNITY

The LCMS Northern Illinois District is developing a Bible Study, Incarnate Community, designed for the whole District that will begin in February. The study is designed to invite congregants to return to an 'in person' community of faith by exploring the God-given blessings that come as the followers of Jesus gather around His Word and Sacraments.

Pastor Hoffman of St. Andrews Lutheran Church in Park Ridge is writing the sermon notes for the third week of the study. The sermon will be based upon the Parable of the Good Samaritan and is titled, "The Beautiful Mess of Ministry."

"I am excited about the story-based sermon texts because they lend themselves to conversations and are easy to relate to all age groups and demographics within our churches," said Hoffman. "There is joy in brining God's people together in ministry."

"I love the word 'Incarnational," continued Hoffman. "It's at the heart of Jesus' ministry. Jesus wanted to be with the people He served and interact face-to-face. We all learned to do some aspects of ministry remotely during the heaviest days of the pandemic. Now, we are blessed to have those tools in our toolboxes, but we also learned that nothing can truly replace sitting in the same room and worshipping with our family in Christ."

Voice of Care believes that God creates all people in His image and all people are intrinsically valued by God. Because of this belief, they are committed to building congregations of belonging in which every person is equally valued and respected and has the opportunity to contribute gifts to strengthening the Christian Church. In fact, Voice of Care believes that a congregation is not whole unless every person has a place to fully belong. This core belief inspires Voice of Care to partner with churches, organizations, and stakeholders to serve people who live with and experience disabilities to advance the Kingdom of God by making disciples. The Good News of Jesus Christ and the redemption He offers is for everyone. With



that commitment, Voice of Care has provided us with a leader's guide for the Bible study which is meant to be used with participants who think and operate on a more concrete level of understanding. They may be young, have intellectual disabilities, and perhaps nonverbal in their communication skills. Concrete learners like to learn through their physical senses, what they can touch, see, hear, taste, and smell. They like to deal with things that exist in the physical world. Abstract learners prefer the world of ideas and feelings. They use reason and intuition to deal with ideas, concepts, and feelings.

The four-session Incarnate Community Bible Study is available as a free downloadable resource on our website at nidlcms.org/incarnate-community-bible-study. While the study materials are designed for groups, they can also be used as a self-study resource.
